It can easily be shown that the mortality bears a certain proportion to the quantity of the poison which the people breathe. That the quantity is great is proved by the cesspool system, which formerly prevailed in London, and is now in use in the French, German, and Italian towns. The mortality has gradually fallen in London as the cesspools have been abolished; it is still high in foreign cities where the cesspools are in use. In Manchester, where the dirt is allowed to decay behind the houses, the rate of the mortality in 1841-50, at the rate of 33 in the year: 1841-50; in the foreign cesspooled cities the mortality ran, as from 30 to 44 in 1,000.

Of 1,000 people in London, ten die unnatural deaths annually: and to make the view of the facts clear let it be assumed for a moment that they are the cause of four deaths no more. It is evident, that the reason why the mortality emanates from the sewers, closets, and sinks in dwelling-houses, offices, and workshops, that two die of diseases induced by the emanations from dirty streets or gullies, and one from the vapours arising from the Thames. Here, evidently, a great step is gained by the water-system, the cesspool, as the noxious matter is subjected into the sewer, and the water and air is partially oxidized. If the cesspools, therefore, are everywhere abolished, and the houses are purified, the mortality on the above hypothesis, will be reduced to the extent of three; while if the corrupt sewer air in the sewers be carried above the chimneys beyond the reach of the lungs, two more lives will be saved. The water and banks of the Thames are no longer the final repositories of the town goun, one more life will be saved. These numbers are adopted, not as expressing exact results, but to fix attention on the fact that the impurities of London are the main cause of its insalubrity; and that in their fatal effects they may be classed in this order—1. Impurities of dwellings. 2. Impurities of streets and gullies. 3. Impurities of the Thames.

The progress of sanitary measures in London has hitherto resulted in the removal of the impurities from the dwelling-houses into the sewers and the Thames, and this enables us to understand how the mortality has declined as the houses have grown fatter. It also enables us to understand how the mortality of London is lower than the mortality of many other cities.

The wise policy of substituting streams of water for cesspools is fully confirmed, and experience has shown that the town goun is less hurtful in the sewers and in the rivers than the stinkings of the cesspools. It is also evident that the supply of town water is not the water saturated with foul organic matter that the people are poisoned in great numbers by the water. The vapours of the Thames, noxious as everybody possessed of common sense has now learnt to consider them, are less heavily laden with poisonous exhalations than the vapours of cesspools and sewers. The practical result of the above facts is, that the Thames itself should therefore be actively continued. At the same time steps should be taken to destroy or to deliver the exhalations of the sewers into the higher stratum of the atmosphere, where they would be partly destroyed, and would not be breathed, as they are now, undiluted. The Thames itself must be purified. Our present imperfect system of sewers and rivers, which carries away the town goun to fertilize the land, from which its materials were derived. Any other solution of the sewage question is provisional.

that some glory may be gained by saving life—by great sanitary works. Honour will crown those who rescue the poor from death, and money will be given to them for every joy the satisfaction of having done their duty.

The Legislature has, in the Acts of the present session given the inhabitants of every district of England and Wales the power to raise the money and to execute the great sanitary works which they may desire. It may be said, accordingly, that the new powers will be employed to their full extent by the people themselves, under the Public Health and the Local Government Acts. The results will in a few years be apparent in the public registers.

METROPOLITAN BOARD OF WORKS.

A meeting of the Board was held yesterday in the Council-chamber, Guildhall; Mr. Thwaites in the chair.

The CHAIRMAN reminded the Board that this was the first occasion on which they had been assembled since additional members had been co-opted to the London Sanitary Act of Parliament which received the Royal assent on Monday, the 28 of August instant.

THE DRAINAGE OF THE METROPOLIS.

A motion by Mr. CARMICHAEL, that the Board do resolve itself into a committee of the whole Board, for the purpose of considering the question of the drainage of the Metropolis was, after some discussion, negatived.

Mr. LESLIE, after laying down the following premises:—
That the management powers vested in the Board of Works by the Act for the Amendment of the Metropolitan Local Management Act for the purposes of the main drains

new, to provide for the removal of the unsanitary road refuse, and to prevent the accumulation of refuse on the mud and filth from the gravelled roads of the metropolis, as those matters can, more beneficially for the public health, be dealt with by the local authorities of the parishes and districts by the scavengers' carts; that it is not desirable to provide for the removal of the refuse of the metropolis by the surface of the ports through the sewers, as it is absolutely necessary for the navigation of the Thames to pour the whole rainfall of the metropolis into the river, and that the surface of the ports to where it falls by surface drains having no connexion with the sewers by gully or ventilating grates; and that the cost of the removal of the refuse of the metropolis by personal exertion and house drains, calculating the same at five cubic feet per head, daily, for 3,500,000 people, added to the cost of the removal of the refuse of the metropolis as before defined, by which it was alleged the rate-payers would be saved at least two millions of the pound sterling annually, would be a very great addition to the main drains purpose, and without creating any nuisance. The scheme having been received as a communication to the Board, the Committee of the Board of Health, the matter should be taken into consideration on an early day.

On the motion of Mr. WRIGHT it was ordered,
That the plans of the main drains of the metropolis, as delivered to the Board of Health, be referred for consideration to a committee, with power to confer with the engineers of the metropolis on the subject.

On the motion of Mr. WRIGHT it was also resolved—
That the Committee of the Board of Health be referred to the new Tiddington Lock, and approximately the quantity of fresh water which is lost by the surface of the ports, and the quantity of water lost daily during dry weather; that the state of the river Thames, as to the depth of the mud at various points, be, from time to time, reported to the Board of Health, and that the Committee of the Board of Health, on these subjects at any early date as possible.

Central India, and burst upon the old territories of the Marathas in the name and with the title of the dethroned Peshwas. As it was, the first proceeding of the Calpee troops after their unexpected victory of fortune was to proclaim him Sovereign of Gwalior; but if the spirit now indicated should really prevail, our authorities may expect rather to receive his head from the hands of his followers than to see him elevated to a nominal throne.

Concurrently with these announcements we receive also information of a considerable extension of leniency on the part of the Supreme Government. In Oude, the Zemindars—always with certain reserves as to their innocence of capital offences and their prompt return to allegiance—are promised a guarantee of their estates. Least eminent delinquents in other parts are also encouraged to win favour, if possible, by the surrender of those who misled them, or to gain merit, at all events, by submission and dispersion without further delay. The only acts, indeed, still branded as unpardonable are those connected with the murders which convulsed Europe with indignation twelve months ago. For these sanguinary assassinations there is to be no mercy—no propitiation of any kind. No vicarious sacrifice of other criminals can be accepted; the murderers are out of the pale of humanity, and must die. With this reservation, all that an insurgent of any rank or station need do is to return to his home, and to assist, according to his power, in the restoration and maintenance of order. Simple rebels, not being actual murderers, are assured of safety on the single condition of future good behaviour. Sepoys guilty of military treason may retire to their own villages with the understanding that inquiry and discrimination will be applied to their respective cases; but if they can earn consideration by the surrender of any leading rebels they may rely upon the enjoyment of life and liberty, notwithstanding even the crime of overt mutiny. In short, revolvers of all classes, with two exceptions only, may now get the benefit of an amnesty by throwing down their arms. Those who have been principals in deeds of murder stand outlawed still, and those who have harboured murderers will be still liable to retribution, though short of capital punishment. Sepoys, again, who have committed actual mutiny are not absolutely released from liability, though they are indulged with hope; but, except for these reservations, the amnesty is complete.

It is fortunate that circumstances so well calculated to inspire confidence should occur at a season when remission and rest are so desirable for our troops. The Central India Field Force nobly earned its relief by the victories of Calpee and Gwalior, and it may be anticipated that the discomfiture of the Oude rebels in the North, combined with the death of the Moulvie of Lucknow elsewhere, will bring some cessation to the tumult of that troublesome province. It is believed, moreover, that the Ramee of Jhansi, one of our most indefatigable enemies, has been
